I am writing to acknowledge receipt of your email dated 27th April 2022 requesting information under the Freedom of Information Act (2000) regarding antenatal appointments.

The University Hospitals of North Midlands Trust is committed to the Freedom of Information Act 2000.

However, the NHS is facing unprecedented challenges relating to the coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic at the current time. Understandably, our resources have been diverted to support our front-line colleagues who are working tremendously hard to provide care for our patients, and to those in need of our services.

We strive to be transparent and to work with an open culture. But at this time, whilst care of our patients and the safety of our staff takes precedent, it is likely that responses to some requests for information will be delayed. We apologise for this position in advance, and will endeavour to provide you with as much information as we can, as soon as we are able.

The Information Commissioners Office has recognised the current situation in the NHS.

As of 1st November 2014 University Hospitals of North Midlands NHS Trust (UHNM) manages two hospital sites – Royal Stoke University Hospital, and County Hospital (Stafford). Therefore the response below is for the two sites combined from that date where appropriate.

- Q1 Does the Trust allow pregnant women to have a partner present at antenatal appointments?
- A1 Yes
- Q2 Does the Trust allow pregnant women to have a partner present at scans?







- A2 Yes
- Q3 Does the Trust allow pregnant women to have a birthing partner present during labour? If so, at what point and how many?
- A3 Two birth partners can attend when the woman is admitted in established labour
- Q4 Does the Trust allow pregnant women to have a birthing partner present during birth? If so, at what point and how many?
- A4 Two birth partners can attend when the woman is admitted in established labour
- Q5 Has the Covid Pandemic resulted in the Trust having to reduce the number of partners present at appointments, scans, labour or birth in the last two years? If so, has this yet returned to pre-pandemic procedure?
- A5 Yes, the Covid Pandemic resulted in the Trust having to reduce the number of partners present at appointments, scans, labour or birth in the last two years.

Maternity Visiting

Antenatal appointments

- Up to one partner can attend all hospital based antenatal appointments
- Up to two partners can attend all community based appointments

<u>Scans</u>

• One partner can attend all scan appointments

Induction of labour and birthing visiting

• Two birth partners can accompany the woman for induction of labour, established labour and birth

Ward visiting (205 and 206)

Visiting is permitted between the times of 9AM and 9PM for partners and own children only. General visiting is permitted between the times of 6PM and 9PM. No more than 2 visitors per bed at one time (including the partner). Children must not be left unsupervised with patients on the ward.

*Please note that any individuals identified do not give consent for their personal data to be processed for the purposes of direct marketing.

UHNM NHS Trust is a public sector body and governed by EU law. FOI requestors should note that any new Trust requirements over the EU threshold will be subject to these regulations and will be advertised for open competition accordingly.
