Dear Sir/Madam

I am writing to acknowledge receipt of your email dated 31st July 2024 requesting information under the Freedom of Information Act (2000) regarding Chiropractic

As of 1<sup>st</sup> November 2014 University Hospitals of North Midlands NHS Trust (UHNM) manages two hospital sites – Royal Stoke University Hospital, and County Hospital (Stafford). Therefore the response below is for the two sites combined from that date where appropriate.

- Q1 This request includes the possibility of any injury etc being suffered while undergoing chiropractic from a third party who doesn't work for the Trust but the victim then presented to the Trust, ie via the A&E department. (link to response on 279-2425)
- A1 I can neither confirm nor deny whether the information you have requested is held by the Trust in its entirety. This is because the information requested in your question is not held centrally, but may be recorded in health records (we have searched our data base by using the word "chiro" in the field where the ED triage notes are typed and following reviewing some records they refer to either the patient been referred from a chiropractor or having seen a chiropractor prior but we have found none from the reviewed that state they think their pain etc is caused by a chiropractor.

Since 01/01/2019 until today there are 252 records which reference "chiro" in their ED triage note so each of them would have to be manually reviewed to see if we can ascertain anything. It would mean reviewing every ED attendance to see if in the paper notes it references chiropractor. To put this into context there are over 160,000 ED attendances each year). Therefore, In order to confirm whether this information is held we would therefore have to individually access all health records within the Trust and extract the information where it is present. We therefore estimate that complying with your request is exempt under section 12 of the FOI Act: *cost of compliance is excessive*. The section 12 exemption applies when it is estimated a request will take in excess of 18 hours to complete. We estimate that accessing and reviewing all health records and then extracting relevant information would take longer than the 18 hours allowed for. In addition to the section 12 exemption the Trust is also applying section 14 (1) exemption: *oppressive burden on the authority*
